She will share some insights and experiences from her work with kids of all ages and invite sharing from the group: "so we can all learn from each other." Isa is also a volunteer for *No One Dies Alone* (NODA) and offers spiritual healing retreats. Her spiritual background is Native American and Universal Sufism with a concentration on healing.

Barry Nobel, JD, PhD has taught courses on Death & Dying and Health Care Ethics at Lane Community College, Linfield College, the University of California, Santa Barbara, and Santa Barbara College of Law. He has led workshops locally on *The World Beyond, Mortality Matters,* and *Mindfulness-based Conflict Engagement*. Barry currently teaches *Mediation* at the University of Oregon. In the past, he worked as a mediator and as an attorney. Barry's spiritual practice focuses on mindfulness from Buddhist and Jewish perspectives. He is the author of *Mindfulness in Judaism; Pursuing Peace: Hillel & Mindfulness-based Conflict Engagement;* and *Religious Healing in the Courts*.
