
matzah supposed to symbolize? - as well as any questions that YOU bring!

Bases of Mass Sociopolitical Violence Found in Psychological Attitudes

Is it possible to identify how perpetrators of genocide, politicide, and ethnic cleansing think? Could we use such knowledge to predict such violence in advance? Dr. Saucier summarizes research identifying



potential dispositional as well as situational factors involved, as well as how these might relate to variation in culture and individual attitudes in the general population, and to what is found in other forms of sociopolitical violence such as militant extremism.

Mr. Seasonwein has practiced law for over 44 years and been a member of: four federal agencies,



a law firm, and the legal departments of two large multi-national corporations. He currently consults on the safety and security of aviation, port facilities, and rail and mass-transit.



From 1991 to 1997 he was a Senior Trial Attorney in the U.S. Department of Justice, Criminal Division, Office of Special Investigations (OSI) in Washington DC, also known, by some with pride and others with suspicion and hatred, as the "Nazi Hunters."

During his time at OSI, he investigated and prosecuted war crimes perpetrators who illegally entered the United States in the post-WWII period. He obtained verdicts in six denaturalization and deportation cases that were tried in U.S. District Courts and Immigrations Courts. Five other individuals fled the country prior to trial.

Mr. Seasonwein has won numerous awards from a variety of federal agencies and educational institutions and has published widely.
